Good Day and Wassail to you...From the Executive Director

It's our last newsletter of 2024, released just in time for sharing with your family and friends during the holiday season.

From the Conococheague Institute I heartily wish you a 'Wassail' with my sincere thanks for your support during our 30th Anniversary year.



The origin of wassail is Middle English wæs hæil 'be in (good) health!', and was adapted as both a greeting and holiday tradition involving wassail the drink. Used as part of a ritual to ensure a good apple harvest, people would sing to each other, as in the song "Here We Come a Wassailing" in a tradition that became our own Christmas Carol traditions.

If you missed any of our programs this year, be sure to look up our video features on YouTube. We have some examples of our wassailing on there and this year have added excellent features on viniculture, dye crafts and more. It's made CI available to 100,000's viewers online!

Fall Funded Projects: December Update

As well as the general operating support through the Matching Campaign, we've seen amazing contributions for the funded projects we launched in September.

The following projects are completely funded:

- \$5,000: Winter Saturday Programs, Martin's Famous Potato Rolls and Bread, gave generously to ensure the community has free programs to attend all winter at CI.
- \$1,500: PA Sound System, Mics and Headsets for Outdoor Lectures and events. Thank you Jan and Lee Davis, and the Mercersburg Academy Cheap Thrills fundraiser!
- \$350: Natural Dye Kits. We're going to make have some colorful programs thanks to Pam Knepper!
- \$1,400: Eagle Scout Archery Targets and Range. We'll never lose another arrow due to the support of Shady Spring Farms.

Field Trips: Fall educational bookings keep history alive in local students

Large field trips have now become the norm, and October saw us hosting 300 students per day from

Greencastle-Antrim Middle School, as well as students from Washington County Public Schools, homeschoolers, and church groups.


This fall, we also adapted to school requests by developing an 18th-century "Law and Crime" program for **JB High School** students studying civics, and another for a **Mercersburg Academy** English Literature class reading *Letters from an American Farmer* by French-American writer J. Hector St. John de Crèvecœur, first published in 1782.



Americana Corner: Preserving America Conference and new Preserving America Partners program In November, CI had the prestigious honor of being chosen as a presenter at the first Preserving America Conference. Hosted by Americana Corner and the American Battlefield Trust, Matthew joined the leaders of Fort Ticonderoga, Washington Crossing, Fort Ligonier, and Vicksburg Battlefield on stage—an illustrious list! Attendees at the conference had the opportunity to learn about what has been successful for these organizations and the best practices to follow. The Conococheague Institute has undergone incredible growth in recent years, and we're thrilled to help others achieve the same.

It was a wonderful experience, and we look forward to next year's conference, where we'll be able to share more about our 2025 Preserving America Partners program: a five-year, \$125k grant that will enable new historic initiatives focused on the nation's anniversary, our animal husbandry program, as well as greatly improving our marketing and infrastructure. Our Volunteers: Giving extra voices to our story

With our growth, our small staff would be overwhelmed by all our programs and educational bookings without our trusted volunteers. They come from all walks of life and are an incredibly varied yet talented group, dedicated to sharing history with the public. This fall, we saw Saturday volunteers in our public programs help with textile processing, grape stomping, hearth cooking, and archery. Our October large field trips wouldn't have been possible without **Sam, Mary, Frank, and Jacob** leading stations for the 300 students we had on-site each day and helping dedicate our new historic marker from the **Pomeroy Foundation**. Our outreach events have also seen great volunteer participation. **Kelly and Damian** helped us ring in the Christmas season at the Mercersburg Tree Lighting, and **Sophia, Stella**, and **Maggie** warmly greeted visitors at the **James Buchanan Birthplace** cabin alongside Matthew during the **Mercersburg Academy** holiday tour.



Animal Husbandry: Pasture Two Complete!

With the cooler weather (and wetter ground), we were able to make fast progress on the second pasture for the animal husbandry exhibit. Our student volunteers from **Mercersburg Academy** came out every week, rain or shine, to lead the work and learned a little about construction techniques along the way.

We finished just in time, thanks to a kind offer from **Phil and Donna Kelly**, who lent us three goats in November to test out the pasture and our management. So, we welcomed **Gabe**, **Aspen**, **and Maple** to the homestead for a week, where they served as great ambassadors for the programs we'll be launching in 2025!



Lawn to Prairie Conversion: 2000 Native Plants for Future Habitat

We mentioned this project in our last newsletter and are excited to share that it's now complete! Thanks to the **Thomas and Nancy Burkey Charitable Fund** through the **Franklin County Community Foundation**, we had the funding to plant 2,000 native plants outside the Visitor Center. Thanks to the aforementioned students from **Mercersburg Academy** (along with several CI staff and volunteers), the plants are now in the ground for winter. Check back in the spring to see how they bloom, and we'll be providing guides on how to replicate the project at home! We learned a lot along the way: for example, the lawn removal tools aren't as simple to use as they are advertised. It took some hard labor to get this project done, but we're proud of everyone who helped along the way!



Fall and Winter Events: Bonfire Night and (many) Christmas Celebrations

A Bonfire without the Fire!

On November 9th, we made some adaptations to our annual Bonfire event. Due to the county-wide drought and fire risk, we decided not to have an actual fire.

Instead, some of our creative volunteers rigged up a lighting system under the fire, which looked great, while Rebecca and Rhys Connors' bagpipe performance was hauntingly powerful and made for an excellent addition. We look forward to more piping at future programs!

Another highlight of the event was, of course, **Miller's Wildlife** Bird of Prey presentation, blacksmithing, craft and food vendors, historic activities, the Eagle Scout archery range, and a children's entertainment program by Ray Owen.

Thank you to everyone who supported the event, and to **Middletown Valley Bank, Visit Hagerstown Washington County CVB, Fast Ink, and Liberty Auto and Tire** for their sponsorships of the activities.

The word "bonfire" comes from the Middle English word *bonefire*, which literally means "a fire of bones." The earliest known use of the word was in the 15th century, though others surmise that its origins lie with the French bon for good. Bonfires were often used for community celebrations, and we certainly consider all our CI bonfires a good time to spend with friends and family.

The colder winter months don't stop us from sharing history with the community. In December, we've been doing outreach at Mercersburg and Greencastle Christmas events, Mercersburg Elementary and Broadfording Church kids' programs, and at the Mercersburg Academy Holiday Campus Tour at the James Buchanan Birthplace cabin. The new year is bringing a new round of lectures and presentations, so look out for us!

Our winter programs are sponsored by Martin's Famous Potato Rolls and Bread and include our outreach, free Saturday programs, and our Colonial Christmas event.

The Welsh Barrens Visitor Center: Open every Saturday 10am to 5pm

Whenever you start your visit we hope you stop by the Visitor Center first. Greet our team, receive the history of Rock Hill Farm, check out the exhibits, and make a purchase in the gift shop (or join as a member to support our mission). Even when the building is closed our staff are often on-site working, so give us a call for a tour.



For our final 30th Anniversary exhibit in the Visitor Center, the focus was on our books, diaries and bibles from our library collection. The earliest examples on display are texts from the 18th century which would have been read by settlers in the region. It also includes a local Robert Davis family bible from the 1800's which is filled with genealogy, and an extensive collection of the diaries, calling cards and mementos of Ida Ann Catherine Steck (1857-1940), donated by her family. The personal details, handwriting and artistry in these early texts are a treasure of local history, and show our links to the community in Welsh Run from the earliest settlement to the modern day.

We have extensive collections and archives in our library, and we wish we could display them all. Perhaps one day...soon!


Looking forward to our future: New expansion of the Welsh Barren's Visitor Center

As we continue to experience significant growth, our infrastructure has faced challenges in keeping up. To address this, our **Board of Directors**, at the recommendation of our **founders**, has partnered with the architect firm **Bushy Feight Morin** to design a plan for a major expansion of our Visitor Center.

This expansion will bring several new features to the museum, including a library, gallery space, conference hall, and ADA-compliant bathrooms—all on the main floor. Beyond enhancing visitor experience and accessibility, the expansion will also help us better manage our storage and archives. The next step, if we move forward, is a large-scale capital campaign to fund the project. **We would love to hear your thoughts!**
